ENFORCEMENT: HAM RADIO COUPLE MURDERED IN NEBRASKA

Authorities in Nebraska have a 34-year-old homeless man in custody who they believe was involved in the weekend deaths of a ham radio couple living in rural Lancaster County.

Lancaster County Nebraska Sheriff Terry Wagner says that Brandon Christopher Crago has been arrested on suspicion of robbery and vehicle theft. He is also being held in connection deaths of Steven Baily, NOUS and his wife Carolyn, NOLAL.

According to the Sheriff's Office, its deputies were called to the Baily residence around noon on Sunday August 10th at the request of a neighbor. That's when authorities found the remains of the two murdered radio amateurs. Joe Eisenberg, KONEB, lives in Lincoln. He knew NOUS and NOLAL. He tells Newsline that the local ham radio community is in horrified by what happened to their friends::

ENFORCEMENT: RUSSIAN HAMS WARNED TO STAY OFF UK AIR FORCE FREQUENCY

Two unnamed amateur radio enthusiasts in the Ulyanovsk region of Russia whom authorities say were the source of unintentional interference to U.K. Air Force pilots have been ordered off of a formerly secret radio frequency used in Russia.

About a month ago United Kingdom telecommunications officials complained to Russian radio authorities that from time to time airborne communications was hindered by some Russian citizens using the same frequency. The British were able to establish that the signal came from the Volga district. Russian telecommunications personnel found the culprits to be a pair of amateur radio enthusiasts aged 25 and 50.



FCC to Raise Vanity Call Sign Fees

On August 11, the FCC announced that the cost of an Amateur Radio vanity call sign will increase 60 cents, from \$11.70 to \$12.30. The fee will increase 30 days after notice of the increase is published in the *Federal Register*; no date has yet been set for publication. The FCC is authorized by the *Communications Act of 1934, as amended*, to collect vanity call sign fees to recover the costs associated with that program. The vanity call sign regulatory fee is payable not only when applying for a new vanity call sign, but also upon renewing a vanity call sign for a new 10 year term.

Bryce Canyon Ham Fest 2008

This year the Bryce Canyon Ham Fest also was the ARRL Rocky Mt Division Convention. This means that they were a number of hams from other states attending. I meet people from Colorado, New Mexico, and Wyoming.

It was well run, with lots of activities. The events started Friday night with check-in, the Wolf hung activity and a few seminars. Having seminars on Friday evening is a first. Usually they start on Saturday.

There were lots of different Seminars. I personally attended the ARRL forum, then seminars on QRP experiences, Commercial Antenna Design and Modeling programs, and Home Emergency Management. I participated in the QLF contest and Transformer toss also. I also participated in the HF Mobile antenna pattern exercise. There were a number of women and children activities for those not interested in the technical side of ham radio. There was a swap meet, but not much stuff. There were a several commercial vendors selling their wares in the main gathering room inside.

ARRL had two people representing them. Our Division Director, from New Mexico, and the ARRL lady (forgot her name) in charge of memberships and recruitment. Both spoke at the Sunday morning meeting. Also in attendance was a young 19 year old assistant director over youth from Atlanta. The ARRL state representatives from Utah, Colorado, and Wyoming were also there.

The QRP one was very good. It inspired me to doing more in this area. This guy was a pro. He based his seminar on his experience this summer where he and his son went on a 70 mile back pack trap for 10 days in the Uinta's over Field Day. He talked about how he planed for his field day rig and antenna. He is an expert on small and light weight. He had a table full of his QRP radios. He has done QRP contests a lot and usually does field day QRP from a location closer to home.

The Home management seminar was put on by a speaker from Provo, who is well versed on how to prepare for emergencies. He was a very good speaker, very entertaining. He makes you think. He covered all aspects, from water, to communications.

The antenna modeling seminar was done by our division director. He works for Sandia Labs. He uses a \$65,000 program to design microwave antenna systems for work. He had some very impressive modeling pictures.

The QLF is a CW contest to see who can send CW with their left foot. It is a large left footed morse code key on the floor. They give you a sentence to send. In past years it has been judged on quality and accuracy of sending, not speed. This year was mostly speed. It was timed as to who could send the sentence the fastest. I tied for first place in this. Only about 5 people participated however. It is fun to watch. I got a nice certificate for all the hard work here.

The Transformer toss is where they have some 10 lb power transformers that you must throw. Usually there is a course where you are judged on accuracy of your throws. This year it was strictly distance. Not many participated in this, so I won this easily. I got another nice certificate for this also. Just what I need to display on a wall.

The HF mobile antenna event was new this year. They plot the radiation pattern of your mobile HF station from 8 points on the circle. It is to show you that it really does make a big difference where the antenna is placed on your vehicle.

They had two dinners you could go to and a Sunday morning breakfast. The Sunday morning breakfast is where they draw most of the prizes.

I think I saw about 200 people in all. They considered it a good turnout considering the price of gas this year. There was not a lot of hams from Northern Utah. I saw 5 or 6 people that I knew from OARC and DCARC.

Bryce Canyon is a beautiful place to go for walks also. It is a 5 hour drive from Ogden. It is at 8000 ft elevation so it is not real hot either. Lots of camp grounds and hotels to stay at. Those that have never been there should consider it someday. It will be 2 or 3 years before another one is done there.
