

Re: WARNING FOR UNLICENSED RADIO OPERATION

Dear Mr. Little:

It has come to the attention of the Federal Communications Commission that at multiple times in the last several months you have operated overpowered transmitting equipment on 11 meters that has interfered with the operation of electrical devices by your neighbors.

The Commission's rules require that you operate your CB station with an FCC certified CB transmitter. The rules also prohibit the use of external radiofrequency power amplifiers (sometimes called linears or linear amplifiers). The rules further provide that use of a non-certified CB transmitter and/or power amplifiers voids your authority to operate the station.

Operation of radio transmitting equipment without a valid FCC authorization is a violation of Section 301 of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, and may subject the responsible parties to substantial monetary forfeitures, in rem arrest action against the offending radio equipment, and criminal sanctions including imprisonment. Because unlicensed operation creates a danger of interference to important radio communications services and may subject the operator to severe penalties, this warning emphasizes the importance of complying strictly with these legal requirements.

UNAUTHORIZED OPERATION OF THIS RADIO STATION MUST CEASE IMMEDIATELY.

You have ten (10) days from the date of receipt of this warning to respond to this office. The response must contain a statement of the specific action(s) taken to bring your CB station into compliance with the Commission's rules and should include a time line for completion of pending corrective action(s). You are directed to support your response with a signed and dated affidavit or declaration under penalty of perjury, verifying the truth and accuracy of the information submitted in your response. Your response should be sent to the address in the letterhead and reference the listed case number.

In an inquiry of this type we are required to notify you that under the Privacy Act of 1974, 5 U.S.C. S: 552a(e)(3), the Commission's staff will use all relevant information before it, including information you disclose in your reply, to determine what, if any, enforcement action is warranted in this matter.

Last month we reported that in mid June the Pony Express would be crossing Utah in route from St. Joseph Missouri to Sacramento California. They run 24/7 for 10 days straight, regardless of weather. It follows the original Pony Express trail down Weber Canyon, over Emigration Canyon, into Salt Lake City and then on to Fairfield Utah before turning west on to Nevada. Your OARC secretary, Maggi Campbell N7HCP, participated in this event providing communications support for the riders as they entered Utah from Fort Bridger Wyoming. The following is an email she sent to friends and family prior to the day of the arrival of the Pony Express Rerun 2009. She does NOT know that I am publishing this so please wish me luck for when she finds out. Hi Hi (Val - K7HCP)

Each year, the Pony Express is commemorated by a Pony Express Rerun that follows the original Pony Express Trail from St. Joseph, Missouri to Sacramento, California, which passes directly through the mountains east of Salt Lake City and on to Nevada. (Alternate years, the rerun is done in reverse order, i.e., Sacramento to St. Joseph.) The official pony express mochilla (the saddle mailbag) is an exact replica of the original and they carry "real" mail for this event. Tomorrow, Sunday, Val & I will be at Fort Bridger, Wyoming, to provide ham radio support to let the riders in Utah know when to expect the pony's arrival to Utah.

Wyoming ham radio clubs do not provide radio support so we travel to Fort Bridger WY to welcome the pony riders to Utah and to alert the Utah sections to the timing of their arrival. Yes, they do have cell phones, but with all the mountains and barren areas, often times, there are no towers because they are following the Mormon Pioneer, Oregon & Pony Express original trails through the wilderness. They travel 10 straight days riding 24/7, rain or shine. Each year, the journey is scheduled around the full moon of June to maximize the likelihood of nighttime moonlight. This year, for the first time, the riders are traveling with a GPS tracker so that interested parties can follow their progress via the internet.

We were at Fort Bridger last year also but when we attempted to use HF radios to let the Utah riders know where the pony was, SLC could not hear our signal (we didn't know if they got our information or not.) The coolest thing: Our signal from Fort Bridger WY skipped right over SLC and a ham radio operator in Carson City, Nevada, heard our communication and relayed our message back to SLC. How cool is that? This year, we will be using amateur radio mountaintop VHF (2 meter) repeaters to relay our signal directly from our car into the Pony Express Rerun Communication Command Center near SLC.
